Introduction

Sailing at RNIYC

Royal North of Ireland Yacht Club sits on the southern shore of Belfast Lough. It is a club renowned for its bustling on the water activities and its ability to nurture the skills of its sailors, enabling them to progress within the sport.

Currently, the 2022 sailing season is shaping up to run relatively normally for the first time since 2019 and should hopefully see us all back on the water at our full compliment.

The past few years have, due to various circumstances, led to some areas of club activity reducing significantly while other

areas have remained strong.

This objective has driven all the actions that follow in this document.


Building on our strong sailing foundation within the club...

The Fairy and Squib classes continue to thrive with impressive fleets on the water last season. The Cruiser class is growing quickly and will present many opportunities both in terms of racing and cruising in the coming years. The RS400 fleet is like no other at the club. It has developed in a very organic way into an NI-wide fleet, moving it's off-peak and seasonal events from club to club. Whilst the fleet do not regularly compete in traditional club racing, they consistently attract sailors from all over Ireland to their local and national events at RNIYC and represent the club proudly.

The key area for development is in the smaller dinghy classes and to increase the number of new sailors to the club, children and adults. 2022 will prioritise sail training through our cadet system and also build on the success of our adult courses held last summer by holding a greater number of courses, opening them up to non-members and hopefully increase the number of places available on each course.

There are already two national events in the sailing calendar for the club in 2022 and this will provide opportunities for anyone who would like to learn how these events are delivered to get involved alongside more experienced members.

The Rescue Team and our powerboat training operate to very high standards and run excellent training programmes for anyone wishing to learn these skills. If our aim to get more new sailors onto the water is to be achieved, these teams will need to grow to support the activity to avoid too much demand made of individual members.

CADETS

STRUCTURE

There will be a clear structure going forward throughout the sailing season. The emphasis will be on honing skills and progressing abilities.

Tuesdays & Thursdays - Club Racing Wednesdays - Levels 1&2 instruction in Visions and instructor led free sailing for others

RACE TRAINING

A "start racing" intense training programme will take place prior to Opening Day on Sunday afternoons.

Cadets who are interested will be encouraged to race on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Where an experienced volunteer will be on hand to hone their skills.

Organise "Start Racing Regattas" around the lough during the season on Sundays. Each club brings a training boat to assist their sailors on the race course and during the race.

FUN

Throughout the season there will be a full calendar of in-club events, both social and sailing.

Including BBQs, Cinema nights, Quizzes, Junior Regatta, talks etc

Cadets will be encouraged to feel part of their club.

OFF SEASON

For racers, there will be a frostie series.

There will also be off season talks, cinema nights, first aid courses




The Cruising Class

Rescue

at RNIYC

The Rescue team at RNIYC is a great group to be a part of! Not only do we have three fully operational RIBs which are in continuous use to provide rescue cover for the Club all season round, we are a RYA powerboat training centre.

You will receive excellent training from our highly experienced RYA instructors and regular opportunities to gain confidence on the water. RNIYC hold sailing events throughout the year; if you volunteer to be part of the team during these events you will also gain first hand experience of course laying and multi-craft safety management.

Onshore Learning

Throughout the year there will be opportunities to hear from both members and guest speakers about their experiences on the water. We will also run a number of courses for our members, including, but not limited to, first aid, VHF, navigation and general theory classes.

Aspirations for sailing development at the club

Below we have highlighted a number of areas to strengthen in order to develop sailing at RNIYC. We hope you can see from this document that we want to encourage everyone to get involved in supporting sailing in whatever way they can. Our aspirations for the club are wide ranging but with your help, we can make it happen.

Volunteer Event

- To take place pre-season
- Showcasing volunteering opportunities within the club
- All skill sets welcome sailing experience is not necessary, a number of opportunities are shore based, administrative, creative etc

Cadets

- The Cadet Officer is the lead contact point for cadet sailing at the club.
- Cadet Parent Forum, will meet monthly to discuss the cadet calendar, both on the water and socially and help identify any training requirements needed.
- Onshore learning including first aid & rules etc
- Prize Giving dinner and regatta at the end of the season

Cadet Wednesday evenings

- Draw up volunteer rota with help from office; encourage parents to populate the rota for a couple of sessions each;
- Allocate instructor(s)
- Ensure instructors plan for both on the water and shore based sessions weather permitting;
- Ensure children are aware that it is instructor led and move toward more structured sailing.

Cadet Racing

- Pre-season training with race instructor on Sundays for cadets of appropriate ability
- The club will ultimately encourage double handed racing fleets in the long term
- Potential to run a small number of "Start Racing Regattas" throughout the season on Sundays with other clubs.
- Frostie Series

Club Racing

- A rolling agenda point, driven by the Fleet Captains within the sailing committee;
- Each fleet must focus on increasing participation and nurturing existing less experienced members of their fleets;
- Cadets will begin to take part in club racing and should be made top feel part of the club.

Aspirations for sailing development at the club - continued

Adult Sailing courses	 Offer more courses through the season for varying levels; Open to non-members
Onshore Learning	 A good opportunity for club wide interest. Varying topics - practical, course based, experience driven, general interest etc Both for cadets and older members
Cruising Class	 Communication - Class members register Encourage short distance Cruise in Companys (CIC) to encourage new/less experienced members of the class and build their confidence Build on existing good relationships with other NI clubs to galvanise interest in potential larger scale Cruise in Company's
Club Boats	 Look at ways to encourage use Develop a sound reporting system and maintenance programme Run rigging workshops
Yard	 SUPs/Kayaks etc should have a space for storage rather than the spar shed Ensure that there is appropriate space for all the dinghies on the ground, with tie downs - racks are good for winter storage, but not ideal during the season.
Events	 Potentially look to hold the prestigious Robin Holme Trophy on the Sunday of Regatta. Each class appoints a representative. Encourage more events at the club in the fleets that we have but also look to host events for the RYA etc
